(3) COURSE CONTENT

The course is an introduction to methodology and the way of organizing research and writing a doctoral thesis. It includes, firstly, an analysis of the basic issues of epistemology. Secondly, an explanation of the basic research tool, especially the distinction between qualitative and quantitative research, myths and reality in their bipolar and oppositional relationship. Finally, issues of credibility in research and questions of ethics and code of conduct are discussed.

We approach key elements of research such as:

- Conducting a literature review and its particularities in fine arts research.
- Scientific manners of using the literature review.
- Formulation of research questions and working hypotheses.
- Research modes in the arts.
- Case studies.

Finally, it delves into the research process in qualitative research, the notion of theory and its role in qualitative research.
