The aim of the course is for doctoral candidates to understand the complexity of methodological scientific and interdisciplinary approaches to art research and to deepen their understanding of methodological issues related to their research. More specifically, the learning outcomes are:

- Specialized knowledge in different methodological approaches.
- An understanding of the interdisciplinary nature of the methodological issues involved in art research with the aim of incorporating the thesis into clear methodological axes.
- Deepening the understanding of specific methodological issues in the disciplines of the thesis.
- Developing the ability to synthesise and assess to solve critical problems in research.

(3) COURSE CONTENT

This course is an in-depth study of the various qualitative research approaches in humanities and the arts. Taking into account the research interests and methodological orientations of the doctoral candidates, it examines selected methodological approaches in areas such as art history and theory, anthropology and sociology of art, semiotics, psychoanalysis, feminist and gender theory, post-colonial readings, cultural studies as well as visual and material culture studies. Emphasis is placed on methodological approaches related to arts and arts research such as ethnographic approaches, autoethnography and reflective methodology, as well as grounded theory.

The course is conducted through presentations, individual and group work in class and individual homework assignments. Candidates will be asked to analyze articles and case studies and relate them to their doctoral research.
